Requirements

- 1. <u>Class Attendance and Participation</u> (15% of the final grade). You are expected to attend every class meeting. Every session missed, without proper explanation provided through the dean's office will result in 1 point reduction of your final grade. You are responsible for materials covered in lectures, much of which goes beyond required readings. Your participation in class discussion will show how well you have understood the readings and where clarification is necessary. It is therefore essential to keep up with the reading assignments.
- 2. <u>Course Paper</u>. A short course paper of 4-5 pages is required. The topic of the paper must be chosen by May 30 from among those given by the instructor. The course readings are the main sources of the paper. The paper should be submitted before or on June 27.
- 3. <u>Exams and Grading.</u> There will be two exams: a mid-session exam and the final exam. The final grade will be calculated in this manner: mid-session exam=35%; final exam=35%; Course paper=15%; class attendance=15%.

Grading System: A=100-90, B+=89-87, B=86-80,C+=79-77, C=76-70, D=69-65, F=64 and below. Incompletes, i.e. "T" grades, ordinarily will not be given.
